



Eat healthy, be physically active


Rx for high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes

Poverty, education, housing, inequality





Definition of HIA

HIA is a systematic process that uses an array of data sources and analytic methods and considers input from stakeholders to determine the potential effects of a proposed policy, plan, program, or project on the health of a population and the distribution of those effects within the population. HIA provides recommendations on monitoring and managing those effects.

Breakdown of Definition

- Systematic process (Six Steps)
- Data sources and analytic methods (Evidence Based)
- Input from stakeholders (Participatory)
- Potential health impacts (Positive & Negative)
- Distribution of those impacts (Health Equity)
- Four Ps (Policy, Program, Plan, Project)
- Provides recommendations (Prospective)

1. Screening: determines whether a proposal is likely to have health impacts and whether the HIA will provide information useful to the stakeholders and decisionmakers.

6. Monitoring and Evaluation: records the adoption and implementation of HIA recommendations, monitors the changes in health and health determinants, and evaluates the process, impact, and outcomes of an HIA.

5. Reporting: documents and presents the findings and recommendations to stakeholders and decisionmakers. The Health Impact Assessment Process

3. Assessment: involves a two-step process that first describes the baseline health status of the affected population and then assesses potential impacts.

4. Recommendations: suggest alternatives that could be implemented to improve health or actions

that could be taken to manage the health effects, if any, that are identified. 2. Scoping: establishes the scope of health impacts that will be included in the HIA, the populations affected, the HIA team, sources of data, methods to be used, and alternatives to be considered. MAP VIEW LIST VIEW











SOCIAL/HEALTH EQUITY ANALYSIS

Town of Davidson Health Equity Analysis

The composite Health Equity Analysis combines the variables in the social and health models. This composite model is adjusted to account for Census blocks with zero population.

The highest composite scores represent high priority communities.
